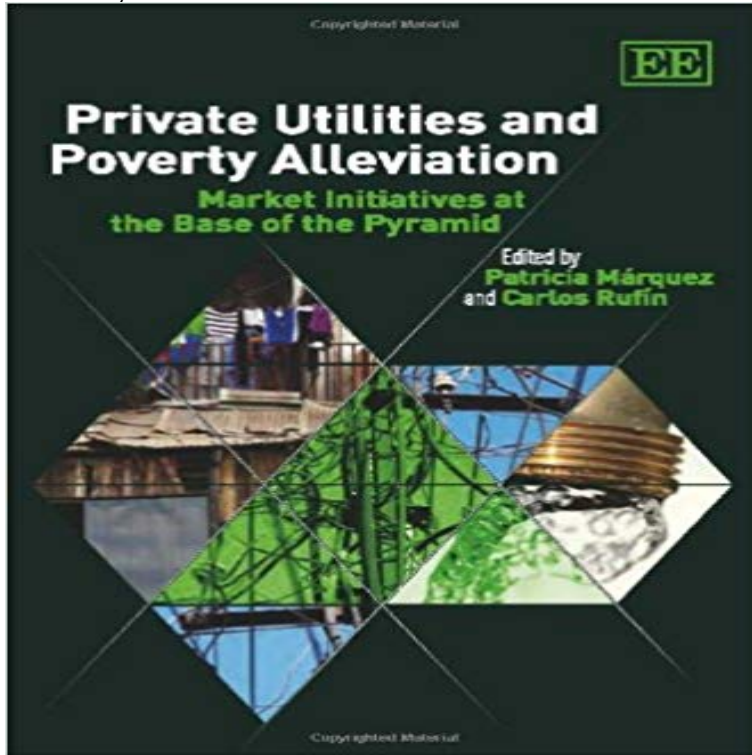


Private Utilities and Poverty Alleviation: Market Initiatives at the Base of the Pyramid
